


Course Questions - Score Analysis









Course Questions - Frequency Analysis


Class Year




Primary reason for taking this course



This class was pretty fun, worth taking. A good amount of work, but manageable.



Course Questions - Score Analysis






Class Year




Primary reason for taking this course

Why did you take this course? How would you describe your level of engagement in the course?

Comments

I took this course because I needed an SA and a friend recommended Professor Bass' lectures to me. I did not expect this course to be as engaging as it was. In fact I expected the course to be easy and boring, even a light-weight. I am happy to say I was completely and utterly wrong. Comments

The paper, midterm, and final were all very straightforward. Enjoyable to study for and the range of questions was humbling and actually challenged me to try and fully master the material. There is a TON of material for this class, but it is all more than worthwhile.

I would have appreciated more guidance on the midterm and final, e.g. knowing that for a four point question you needed four separate points and knowing ahead of time that you couldn't reuse cases for the two essays on the final. That said, I really enjoyed writing the term paper and I think it was a good time in the semester to do so.

Paper was hard but interesting. Midterm was a memory test and the final was somewhere in between the two.

There was only one paper in the class. It was very open ended and the assignment itself was fine. My only wish was that it either came earlier or that the grade for it came out sooner. I still have no idea where I stand in the class, and whether or not I'm going to regret not PDFing the course. The midterm exam was fine. My only complaint is Professor Bass' love of having trick questions that are purposely meant to be hard so that only a few people will get them.

Comments

Again, wonderful readings, probably my favorite readings for any class outside of the HUM Sequence. All felt deeply relevant - we were offered basically a Greatest Hits list of human rights political theory and papers from the past few decades. Some of the primary documents of dissidents from across the world were incredibly moving and painful to read. Also important that we be aware of the history of trauma and resilience that has silently shaped so much of the modern world.

Loved most of the readings, but the sheer amount was impenetrable most weeks. I think this course would benefit from fewer readings (some weeks they were fairly similar from piece to piece) so that we could go more in depth in precept. Alternatively, this would be a great seminar class.

No visuals: only a blackboard. I love that lecturing style. Readings were always good but there were a lot of them. I did not do them all...

I really enjoyed the book readings. I will be finishing some of the books on my own time because of how well-written they were. The Blood Telegram, Endgame, and so on were amazing books.
